Facilitated small-group discussions will focus on the main barriers & obstacles to reducing the amount of shoreline hardening permitted annually in Virginia. This issue will be explored from four perspectives: Legal, Technical, Social-Political, & Financial

**12:45 – 2:15 Breakout Session 2 – Getting a Closer Look at Adaptive Management**

Adaptive management activities will be highlighted at 2 outdoor field stations on the VIMS campus & 1 indoor station in the auditorium. Participants can move between stations as they choose. Shuttles will be available to assist with transportation.

**A. VIMS Beach & Offshore Breakwaters**      *Donna Bilkovic, Molly Mitchell CCRM*

The results from recent living shorelines research will be highlighted by the scientific investigators. This station will have close-up examination of benthic animals that live on and around the rocks. Fish and other aquatic animals that inhabit the lagoon areas between the breakwaters will be captured with seine nets and put on display.

**B. VIMS Teaching Marsh**      *Julie Bradshaw, Christine Tomblason CCRM*

This station will feature salt marsh plant identification and how tidal wetlands can be created for living shorelines and wetland compensation.

The history of the VIMS Teaching Marsh includes one of the first marsh sill projects in Virginia installed in 1984 that still effectively protects this part of the campus. How marsh sills are constructed and maintained will be described at this station.
